<u>Homework</u>

I typically assign schoolwork as opposed to homework however, homework may be necessary at times. Homework will be given to reinforce what has been learned in class, prepare students for upcoming lessons and extend and generalize concepts, teach responsibility, help students develop positive study habits, or if schoolwork hasn't been completed during school hours. At times homework may not be graded, simply viewed as practice. Other times homework will be graded as such:

* (star) meaning work completed, demonstrates full understanding of skill or concept,

./ (check) meaning work completed, but mistakes show some misunderstandings,

- (minus) means work is incomplete, or complete misunderstanding.

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<u>School Routines</u>

PBIS- PBIS is a systematic approach to establishing a positive school culture. PBIS is based on a problem-solving model and aims to prevent inappropriate behavior through teaching and reinforcing appropriate behaviors. Brain research continues to show that student learning cannot be maximized unless students feel comfortable, safe, and

welcome. PBIS has helped create positive learning environments in schools across Wisconsin and the country and we will continue using it to improve the learning environment in the St. Germain Elementary School. The PBIS matrix is posted in each of our classrooms and throughout the school.

Virtues-A character education program that we use to promote and celebrate positive behaviors is called Virtues. Students are recognized immediately for displaying the virtues by staff members and also in a drawing at our Color Days throughout the year. A virtue is highlighted each week and posted in the classrooms and throughout the school.

Technology-Students are 1:1 with Chromebooks while in school. Whether in school, at home, or when internet/WiFi is available, students have log-ins for Google Classroom, Discovery Ed, Prodigy, ConnectED(Reading/Language Arts program), Bridges (Math), Epic, Google Drive, Typing Agent, and Spelling City. See your child for their log-in information and always practice good internet etiquette.

If students are misusing the technology I use a progressive approach. First offensestudents are given a verbal warning, second- their device is taken away for 1/2 a day, third- device is taken away for a full day, etc...You will be notified once their device is taken away. If a serious misuse occurs their device may be taken away and their account disabled according to the technology agreement form signed at the beginning of the year.



Grading Scale

Assessing student work will take two major forms; formative and summative. Formative work can be considered as daily work or "practice" work. Although not all practice work will be graded, I will use the following scale for graded work:

* (star) work is completed and meets expectations. You are done.

./ (check) work is completed, but mistakes show some misunderstandings. Make corrections and hand back in.

- (minus) work is incomplete or complete misunderstanding shown. Please redo after further instruction and hand back in.

Summative work can be considered as end of unit projects, tests, or culminating activities. I will use the following scale:

4-Exceeding the Standard

3-Meeting the Standard

2-Progressing toward the Standard

1-Area of Concern



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Responsive Classroom

This year you and your child will hear and see us implementing Responsive Classroom practices. Responsive Classroom practices teach children essential skills, incorporate fun activities in learning, structure the day, teach discipline, and build academic engagement. Our focus is on bringing together social-emotional and academic learning throughout the day. This research proven approach offers:

- Engaging academics,
- Builds positive community,
- Effectively manages classrooms, and
- Matches instruction to student's developmental strengths and needs.

I will continue to share more information about Responsive Classroom throughout the year in my weekly newsletters.



Routines

Please take a few minutes to read and discuss the following classroom routines. This certainly doesn't contain all routines and is subject to change based on student/class needs. I want to explain some major routines so we are all on the same page in regards to them. If you have any questions, concerns, or comments please contact me anytime throughout the year.

Math: In math class, students are asked to complete work in pencil and correct in red pen. This year we will use the Bridges Math series. This math series teaches math using a combination of whole-group, small-group, and independent activities that are problem centered. Students engage in 6 kinds of activities. Problems and Investigations are whole-group, problems and investigations start as wholegroup then move to individual and partner work. Work Places are engaging partner games. Math Forums are whole-group number talks. Problem Strings are fast-paced exercises focusing on using efficient strategies. Number Corner is a whole-group quick daily skills activity. Assessments are both observational and written. Mastering basic addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division facts 0-12 is essential!

<u>Reading/Language Arts</u>: Students will work on the quality and quantity of reading and writing this year. We focus a lot on written language. Students will be required to write in all subjects. Writing for all subjects will be assessed using the 6+1 Traits format.

If I am unable to read it, I am unable to grade it and it will be returned for a rewrite. Often students will have a choice of print, cursive, or typed form. Spelling will be embedded into the whole curriculum this year. We will also focus on sight/trick words. Students will practice their keyboarding skills using an online touch typing program. This can be accessed and practiced online. See your child for login information.

We will be using a comprehensive reading/writing/ spelling and vocabulary series entitled Wonders. This

program has leveled readings and books, trade books, practice workbooks, vocabulary lessons, spelling lessons, incorporated activities across the disciplines, among oth- ers. Your child also has access to an independent, self-paced, and online reading library called Epic. See your child for login information.
